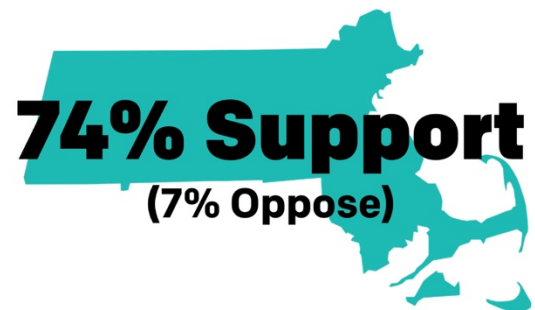




BAY STATERS WANT U.S. INVESTMENT AGAINST GLOBAL DISEASE

ONE's 2026 national survey finds that **a large and growing majority of Bay Staters support US funding to fight infectious diseases overseas**, including investments in childhood vaccines and HIV/AIDS treatment – the very things Congress funds via PEPFAR, Gavi, and the Global Fund.

By a more than ten-to-one margin, Bay Staters believe the US government should invest in preventing and treating diseases in other countries to reduce the risk of future outbreaks reaching the United States. 74% support US global disease prevention funding, compared to just 7% who oppose it. 19% remain neutral or unsure.



Support is strong in both parties: Nationally, self-identified **Trump voters support US funding to combat disease overseas by a 5-to-1 ratio** [65% support, 13% oppose], while **86% of Democratic voters support global health investments**, with only 3% opposed.

Strong Support for Child Vaccine Funding Notwithstanding Vaccine Hesitancy

Massachusetts residents support US funding for childhood vaccination programs in low-income countries by an eight-to-one margin: 72% favor global vaccine funding, compared to just 9% opposed and 20% neutral or unsure. National support spans party lines, with 63% of Republicans supporting [with only 14% opposed] and 85% of Democrats supporting [with 4% opposed]. This support persists even while 55% of Americans express some personal vaccine hesitancy. Many hesitant Americans still support immunization programs abroad, viewing global funding and personal vaccine choices as distinct issues.

Even Stronger Support for funding HIV/AIDS Treatment

Eighty percent of Bay Staters support US funding for global HIV/AIDS treatment programs, compared to just 10% who oppose it. **Support has increased by 2 percentage points since last year.** Strong majority support exists on both sides of the aisle: Nationally, 72% of Trump voters and 91% of Democratic voters support US investment in HIV/AIDS treatment abroad.

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
